A Note From Fr. Jim Kinney

Faith rooted in experience is at the heart of our faith. First there was Abraham, our father in faith. Abraham trusted God and left his home in obedience. He began to receive what was promised, the realization of what he hoped for. Generations later Abraham's descendants, the Israelites, knew how God provided for Abraham, trusted in God and had the courage to wait to see his justice.

Christ's disciples, even though the land promised to them was under Roman occupation, had the privilege of seeing and knowing the Messiah, fully realizing what generations had hoped for. Jesus assured them that they could be confident in God's desire to fulfill his promises to them- "Do not be afraid little flock, for your Father is pleased to give you the kingdom." As God provided for Abraham, the Israelites, and the disciples, we can trust him to provide for us. We can be like vigilant servants, ever ready for the realization of what we hope for.

Today's gospel comes to us in the middle of Ordinary Time, but it is strongly reminiscent of the Advent season. The enjoinders to remain vigilant and prepared echo the readings we hear in December. It is timely in a sense, as this long stretch of Ordinary Time is one where we might be tempted toward passivity. But it is a time meant for growth, engagement and attentiveness. Let us commit to the alertness of Advent, the gratitude of Christmas, the repentance of Lent and the joy of Easter.

Saint of the Day: St. Maximilian Kolbe August 14
Saint Max was born as Raymond Kolbe, born to
a poor, Catholic family in Russian occupied Poland.
His parents, worked at home as weavers. His
father, enlisted in the army; he was hanged by
the Russians as a traitor.. His mother, later became
a nun. Raymond entered the Franciscan junior
seminary in Poland in 1907 and chose the name
Maximilian making his final vows in 1914. Fr. Max
was imprisoned in Pawiak prison in Warsaw, Poland

in 1941. He was transferred to the Auschwitz concentration camp in occupied Poland and branded as prisoner 16670. He was assigned to a special work group staffed by priests and supervised by especially vicious and abusive guards. His calm dedication to the faith brought him the worst jobs available, and more beatings than anyone else. At one point he was beaten, lashed, and left for dead. The prisoners managed to smuggle him into the camp hospital where he spent his recovery time hearing confessions. When he returned to the camp, Maximilian ministered to other prisoners, including conducting Mass and delivering communion using smuggled bread and wine. In July 1941 there was an escape from the camp. Camp protocol, designed to make the prisoners guard each other, required that ten men be slaughtered in retribution for each escaped prisoner. Francis Gajowniczek, a married man with young children, was chosen to die for the escape. Maximilian volunteered to take his place, and died as he had always wished - in service.

Meditation: One of the most painful things when navigating hardship and heaviness is the feeling that you are doing it alone, that you have no one to support or love you through the worst parts. I imagine Jesus felt that in moments during his passion. When people hurled rocks and spit upon him. When the religious leaders and gathered crowds jeered at him. When his closest friends ran away in fear, completely abandoning him. Sometimes the greatest lessons we can learn from various women and men in the Scriptures are from those who spoke the least or, at least in Simon's case, who appear to have no recorded words. Simon is a reminder for us to show up and be with those who need help carrying the load of suffering in their lives. —from St. Anthony Messenger's "Let Us Pray: Help Me to Be Simon" by Patricia Breen Pause and Pray: Embracing All Reflect: He came to the United States with little beyond the certainty that he was meant to be a priest, something he couldn't do in his native Czech Republic because of an oversupply. John Neumann (1811-1860) was ordained less than a month later, and tirelessly ministered to German and Italian immigrants as well as native-born Americans in the mid-Atlantic states, including eight years as Philadelphia's bishop. Pray: St. John Neumann, I don't know what to say or do when I encounter people who don't talk or look like me. May I remember that just as with you, a saint in the making is in them—and me. Act: Write a letter, sign a petition, make a donation, or volunteer to help an outsider today.

Podemos ser como sirvientes vigilantes, siempre listos para la realización de lo que esperamos.

El Evangelio de hoy nos llega en medio del tiempo ordinario, pero recuerda fuertemente a la temporada de adviento. Los encierros para permanecer vigilantes y preparados hacen eco de las lecturas que escuchamos en diciembre. Es oportuno en cierto sentido, ya que este largo tramo de tiempo ordinario es uno en el que podríamos vernos tentados hacia la pasividad. Pero es un momento destinado al crecimiento, compromiso y atención. Comprometemos con el Alerta del advenimiento, la gratitud de la Navidad, el arrepentimiento de la Cuaresma y la alegría de la Pascua. Paz, Padre Jim.
