A Note From Fr. Jim Kinney

The gospel today shows us in parable form what the "greed that is idolatry" looks like. The rich man with the bountiful harvest is shown to be isolated, oblivious of both God and his fellow human beings. In a world of limited goods, his solution is shocking; he will tear down his barns and build bigger ones, where he will stockpile his goods for many years. In contrast, first century Palestinians did not operate within a system of capitalism. They considered all goods limited, so that if one person acquired more, it necessarily meant that others went without.

Hoarding for Palestinians was a clear sign of greed, the vice most destructive to community life. The rich man's self-centered plan is interrupted by a startling apparition by God. "You fool" comes the accusation, with the notice that this very night his "life will be demanded." The critical question is, all "the things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?" The clear biblical answer comes from Psalm 24:1: "The earth is the Lord's and all that it holds." Everything belongs to God; even life itself is given to us on loan.

Jesus's parable cuts two ways. To those who are blessed with abundance, hard questions are posed about its legitimate use, greediness, and just distribution of resources for the common good. To those on the underside of privilege, there is encouragement to unmask vicious greed and to engage in efforts to bring about economic justice, while warning against violence in doing so.

Saint of the Day: Saint John Vianney August 4 Born to a farm family. In his youth John taught other children their prayers and catechism. Ordained in 1815, though it took several years of study - he had little education, was not a very good student, and his Latin was terrible. Assigned as a parochial vicar to Ecully, France. In 1818 was assigned to Ars-Sur-Formans parish in France, a tiny village near Lyons, which suffered from very lax attendance. He began visiting his parishioners, especially the sick and poor, spent days in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, did penance for his parishioners, and leading his people by example. Had the gifts of discernment of spirits, prophecy, hidden knowledge, and of working miracles. Tormented by evil spirits when

trying to get 2-3 hours of sleep each night. Crowds came to hear him preach, and to make their reconciliation because of his reputation with penitents; by 1855 there were 20,000 pilgrims a year to Ars. Spent 40 years as the parish priest. Born: 8 May 1786 at Dardilly, Lyons, France Died: 4 August 1859 at Ars, France of natural causes; interred in the basilica of Ars Venerated: 26 July 1896 by Pope Leo XIII1896 Beatified: 8 January 1905 by Pope Saint Pius X Canonized: 31 May 1925 by Pope Pius XI

Pause and Pray: Reflect: Have you ever felt removed or distant from God as things around you are falling apart? Maybe in those moments you wonder if God is punishing you from something in your past. Pray: Padre Pio, You were a gifted spiritual director, and you were always quick to reveal the works of the enemy in the spiritual lives of your directees. I ask you to reveal where the devil is trying to trick me, leading me into despair and lack of confidence in God. Intercede for me, bringing me into the arms of God where I can trust in his love for me—even if he feels distant. Act: Entrust yourself to the care of Padre Pio whenever you find yourself wondering if God is punishing you.

The Saints Beacon Us: The saints lived lives marked by the promise of liberation that Jesus brings forth through his life, death, and resurrection. They became vessels of God's hope to God's people. They allowed themselves to be transformed by the truth of Scripture, practicing the traditions and teachings of our faith in a way that welcomed all people to the table. As a universal Church, we can learn from these three holy people how to love our neighbor, make space for others, and live daily lives marked by the love of the Gospel. The lives of the saints beckon us onto the road to Emmaus. They draw us into the conversation of faith, life, and the ways in which we can love each other and, in doing so, love God. They draw us out of isolation, indifference, and darkness to walk along a road that leads us to a table where everyone is welcomed to come and break bread with the Messiah.—from St. Anthony Messenger's "Our Saints, Ourselves" by Vanesa Zuleta Goldberg

Información de comunidad Español

El evangelio de hoy nos muestra en parábola en forma de la "codicia que es idolatría". Se muestra que el hombre rico con la abundante cosecha está aislada, ajena tanto a Dios como a sus compañeros seres humanos. En un mundo de bienes limitados, su solución es impactante; Derribará sus graneros y construirá otros más grandes, donde almacenará sus productos durante muchos años. En contraste, los palestinos del primer siglo no operaron dentro de un sistema de capitalismo. Consideraron todos los bienes limitados, de modo que si una persona adquirió más, necesariamente significaba que otros se quedaron sin.

El acaparamiento de los palestinos era una clara señal de codicia, el vicio más destructivo para la vida comunitaria. El plan egocéntrico del hombre rico se ve interrumpido por una aparición sorprendente de Dios. "Tu tonto" viene la acusación, con el aviso de que esta misma noche se exigirá su "vida". La pregunta crítica es que "las cosas que has preparado, a ¿a quién pertenecerán?" La clara respuesta bíblica proviene del Salmo 24: 1: "La tierra es la del Señor y todo lo que tiene". Todo pertenece a Dios; Incluso la vida misma se nos otorga préstamos.

La parábola de Jesús corta dos maneras. Para aquellos que están bendecidos con abundancia, se plantean preguntas difíciles sobre su uso legítimo, la codicia y la simplemente distribución de recursos para el bien común. Para aquellos en la parte inferior del privilegio, hay aliento para desenmascarar la codicia viciosa y participar en esfuerzos para lograr justicia económica, mientras advierte contra la violencia al hacerlo.
