A Note From Fr. Jim Kinney

Today's Gospel reading is taken from Jesus' dialogue with Nicodemus, a Pharisee, and member of the Sanhedrin who was sincerely interested in Jesus' teaching. Jesus speaks of being "lifted up" as the serpent was lifted up in the desert, healing Israelites bitten by asps as they sought a new life on their way from Egypt to the Holy Land. It was an omen of Christ's healing us by his crucifixion and death on the cross. While we rejoice in the cross of Jesus, it should at least give us momentary pause to be celebrating a Roman torture device. In truth what Jesus says must be "lifted up" is instead brutally ugly- the bloodied and broken God-man, nailed to wood.

The salvation God brings us does not come from any means we might expect. Instead, God sends his Son who, taking the form of a slave, humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross. Paul's song in Philippians describes Jesus Christ as a revelation of what God is like. While most religions fashion images of God as an all-powerful dominant one to be placated, as the one who dishes out punishment and reward, Jesus reveals a scandalous --- some say blasphemous --- image of God in Christ. Jesus' image of God turns human projections inside out.

The God revealed in Jesus has no need or desire to awe or frighten us into submission. Paul calls Jesus a slave. He was not purchased or compelled, rather he chose consciously and purposely to consecrate himself to doing the will of God. Jesus loved what God loves --- all of creation. He was born of a woman, he had to grow and learn and fall and get up. He used his eyes to see God's creation, his ears to see people's cries, his heart to know and share God's love, his touch to heal and his will to do everything he could to help human beings to flourish. The will of Jesus, as that of his Father. is always that humans fulfill their vocation to live in God.

Saint of the Day: St. Cornelius September 16 Bishop. Reluctant 21st pope, elected after a year-and-a-half period during which the persecutions were so bad that papal ascension was a quick death sentence. Worked to maintain unity in a time of schism and apostasy. Fought Novatianism and called a synod of bishops to confirm him as rightful pontiff, as opposed to the anti-pope Novatian. Had the support of Saint Cyprian of Carthage and Saint Dionysius. He welcomed back those who had apostatized during the persecutions

of Decius; the documents that settled this matter prove the final authority of the Pope. Exiled to Centemcellae in 252 by Roman authorities to punish Christians in general, who were said to have provoked the gods to send plague against Rome. Martyr. A document from Cornelius shows the size of the Church in Rome in his papacy: 46 priests, 7 deacons, 7 subdeacons, approximately 50,000 Christians. Papel Ascension: 251 Died: martyred in 253, buried at the cemetery of Saint Callistus at Rome, Italy

Minute Meditation: Francis and Anthony: Brothers in Alms Anthony's ascent to sainthood was even more meteoric than Francis'. The citizens of Padua demanded that "their saint" be canonized, and on May 30, 1232, less than a year after his death, Gregory IX announced that this "Hammer of Heretics"-because of Anthony's profound knowledge of Scripture-was now among the saints of the church. In so doing, no doubt the pope intended to reward a staunch ally, but also to send a message to the Lesser Brothers. After all, did their Order really deserve a second saint so soon? Dominic had died in 1221, five years before Francis, and had not yet been canonized-that would not happen until 1234. But Gregory wished to point out to the Lesser Brothers at this critical moment of their history that in addition to their founder, they could aspire to another model of holiness. The Franciscans now had two saints, Francis and Anthony, who symbolized two strains that would exist, sometimes in tension, among them from that time forward. -from Franciscan Media's "Loving Brothers, Beloved Saints: Francis and

Información de comunidad Español

La lectura del Evangelio de hoy está tomada del diálogo de Jesús con Nicodemo, un fariseo y miembro del Sanedrín que estaba sinceramente interesado en la enseñanza de Jesús. Jesús habla de ser "levantado" como la serpiente fue levantada en el desierto, sanando a los israelitas mordidos por áspides mientras buscaban una nueva vida en su camino de Egipto a Tierra Santa. Fue un presagio de la curación de Cristo por su crucifixión y muerte en la cruz. Mientras nos regocijamos en la cruz de Jesús, al menos debería darnos una pausa momentánea para celebrar un dispositivo de tortura romano. En verdad, lo que Jesús dice que debe ser "levantado" es, en cambio, brutalmente feo: el Dios-hombre ensangrentado y roto, clavado en la madera.

La salvación que Dios nos trae no proviene de ningún medio que podamos esperar. En cambio, Dios envía a su Hijo que, tomando forma de esclavo, se humilló a sí mismo, haciéndose obediente hasta la muerte, y muerte de cruz. La canción de Pablo en Filipenses describe a Jesucristo como una revelación de cómo es Dios. Mientras que la mayoría de las religiones diseñan imágenes de Dios como un dominante todopoderoso para ser aplacado, como el que reparte castigo y recompensa, Jesús revela una imagen escandalosa --algunos dicen blasfema --- de Dios en Cristo. La imagen de Dios de Jesús da la vuelta a las proyecciones humanas.

El Dios revelado en Jesús no tiene necesidad ni deseo de asombrarnos o asustarnos para que nos sometamos. Pablo llama a Jesús esclavo. No fue comprado ni obligado, sino que eligió consciente y deliberadamente consagrarse a hacer la voluntad de Dios. Jesús amó lo que Dios ama --- toda la creación. Nació de una mujer, tuvo que crecer y aprender y caer y levantarse. Usó sus ojos para ver la creación de Dios, sus oídos para ver los gritos de las personas, su corazón para conocer y compartir el amor de Dios, su toque para sanar y su voluntad de hacer todo lo posible para ayudar a los seres humanos a florecer. La voluntad de Jesús, como la de su Padre, es siempre que los humanos Paz, Padre Jim. cumplan su vocación de vivir en Dios.
