A Note From Fr. Jim Kinney

One of the most misunderstood things in scripture as well as in the psalm which we just prayed for today's feast of the Holy Family, is that four letter word, "fear." Indeed today's psalm could be better written and heard if it were "Blest are those who stand in awe of the Lord." An attitude of awe speaks to the immense greatness and love of God. "Fear" of the Lord sounds like an attitude of ongoing anxiety, a constant concern that we might do something deserving of punishment.

Members of the Holy Family held each other in the highest esteem. God entrusted Joseph and Mary with his only begotten Son. As great a gift and challenge as that was for them, only love and awe for the Lord in his vulnerable infancy filled their hearts. Theirs was an experience of overwhelming goodness and beauty. In return, as Sirach suggests, the interrelationships of the Holy Family commanded only honor, reverence and love for each other.

As we look from the Holy Family to the regard in which we hold our own families, Paul suggests, as God's chosen ones, that we should aspire to holiness. With that come attitudes of heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another. And over all of these we are to put on love, the bond of perfection.

Finally Today, as we hear of the Holy Family fleeing for their lives into a foreign land, we might ask ourselves what kind of welcome would we offer newcomers if they were none other than Jesus' family. Food for thought!



Saint of the Day: Thomas A. Becket

Of Norman ancestry. Educated at Merton Priory, the University of Paris, in Bologna, Italy, and in Auxerre, France. Civil and canon lawyer. Soldier and officer. Archdeacon of Canterbury, England, ordained in 1154. Friend of King Henry II. Chancellor of England. Ordained on 2 June 1162 and appointed Archbishop of Canterbury on 3 June 1162. Opposed the King's interference in ecclesiastical matters which led to his being exiled several times and eventually murdered by supporters of the king. Martyr. *Born:* 21 December 1118, London, England *Died:* murdered on 29 December 1170 in the Cathedral at Canterbury, England, Some relics enshrined at the Ladyewell Shrine in Lancaster, England *Canonized:* 21 February 1173 by Pope Alexander III.

Ask A Franciscan: I understand as humans, we are responsible for our own actions and inflict suffering on one another. However, there is suffering and abuse that is not the result of our decisions. Like hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, and other natural disasters? We cannot control nature; only God can do that. Why do you think God inflicts such natural disasters on many innocent, God-loving people? Doesn't your question assume that God operates in human time (past/present/future), initiating these natural disasters as punishment for some human action? Is that really the case? What if God is equally present to all time simultaneously? I realize that may sound crazy, but isn't that better than imposing our sense of time on God, forcing God to operate in human time? The natural disasters you list indeed kill people, injure others, and destroy vast amounts of property and goods. All of that is regrettable. These disasters, however, reflect atmospheric conditions—for which God is ultimately responsible. Does God decide which person gets hit by lightning and then dies? No. Does God decide which thousands of acres may be destroyed by a single wildfire? No. Does that then mean that some parts of God's creation are beyond divine control? No. Some people use all human suffering as a reason not to believe in God—as though God were supremely indifferent to human suffering. That is not the God we meet in the Bible. The community of faith, however, identifies the Bible as divine self-revelation; and does not come with a table of contents. Believers recognize the unique status of those books and help us sort through questions that still arise. In my observation, people are more likely to stop believing in God because of tragedies caused by the misuse of human freedom than because of the natural disasters that you cite. God wants us to respond to both types of suffering by a proper and generous use of human freedom. We cannot prevent natural disasters, but we can take steps to make people less vulnerable to the next ones.

Una de las cosas más malinterpretadas en las escrituras, así como en el salmo por el que acabamos de orar en la fiesta de hoy de la Sagrada Familia, es esa palabra de cuatro letras, "temor". De hecho, el salmo de hoy podría escribirse y escucharse mejor si fuera "Bienaventurados los que se apoyan en temor al Señor." Una actitud de asombro habla de la inmensa grandeza y amor de Dios. "Miedo" al Señor suena a una actitud de ansiedad constante, una preocupación constante de que podamos hacer algo que merezca castigo.

Los miembros de la Sagrada Familia se tenían mutuamente en la más alta estima. Dios confió a José y María su Hijo unigénito. Por muy grande que fuera ese regalo y desafío para ellos, solo el amor y el asombro por el Señor en su vulnerable infancia llenaron sus corazones. La suya fue una experiencia de bondad y belleza abrumadoras. A cambio, como sugiere Siraj, las relaciones entre la Sagrada Familia solo imponían honor, reverencia y amor mutuo.

Al mirar de la Sagrada Familia al respecto que tenemos por nuestras propias familias, Pablo sugiere, como elegidos de Dios, que deberíamos aspirar a la santidad. Con eso vienen actitudes de compasión, bondad, humildad, paciencia, paciencia, paciencia y paciencia mutua. Y sobre todo esto debemos poner amor, el vínculo de la perfección.

Por último, hoy, al oír hablar de la Sagrada Familia huyendo por sus vidas a una tierra extranjera, podríamos preguntarnos qué tipo de bienvenida ofreceríamos a los recién llegados si no fueran otros que la familia de Jesús. ¡Algo para reflexionar!
