A Note From Fr. Jim Kinney

Myth may be found untrue in a strict historical sense and yet there might still be some very profound reality contained in myth that merits our belief. Herod's ordering a massacre of children born around the time of the Magi's travels merits that sort of belief even if historians are hard pressed to posit such a reality. Typical of Jesus's enemies, Herod couldn't tolerate the danger Jesus posed to the evil powers that propped him up. Even if Herod didn't order the massacre, he was cruel enough to order the death of his own sons, whom he saw as rivals.

Matthew's gospel was written primarily for a Jewish audience which struggled to welcome Gentile believers. This is the gospel in which Jesus told his disciples to go out on mission but "only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." And he told the Canaanite woman that he had been "sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." It was her faithful persistence that caused him to see that his mission could embrace others beyond his own people. That change of mind was found at the end of his gospel in his instructions "to go and make disciples of all nations."

This all-inclusive mission of Christ is already foreshadowed in the opening chapter of Matthew's gospel, where exotic visitors from the East are the first to do homage to Jesus. The Magi were actually Persian priests, astrologers who served their king with skills such as interpreting dreams. With gifts for the Christ child, they foreshadowed the way Gentiles will flock to Christian communities, bearing gifts for mission. Paul in his own way reflects the Magi's spirit through his life-changing discovery of the mystery of Christ's love. The gospel of Matthew will go on to highlight Christ as our Emmanuel, God with us, with no strangers to be found in God's eye's.

Saint of the Day: John Nepomucene Neumann January 5

Son of Philip, who was German and owned a stocking factory, and Agnes Neumann who was Czech. John was a small and quiet boy with four sisters and a brother, and was named after St. John Nepomucene. An excellent student, he early felt drawn to religious life. Seminarian at Budweis, Bohemia in 1813, he studied astronomy and botany in addition to theological topics. Studied theology at Charles Ferdinand University at Prague in 1833. When time for his ordination, his bishop was sick; the ordination was never re-scheduled as Bohemia had an over-abundance of priests. John decided to go to America to ask for ordination, and to work with emigres. He walked most of the way to France, then took ship for America, arriving unannounced in Manhattan in 1836. Bishop John Dubois was happy to see him; there were 36 priests for the 200,000 Catholics in New York and New Jersey. John was ordained on 28 June 1836, and sent to Buffalo. There the parish priest, Father Pax, gave him the choice of the city of Buffalo or of the rural area; John chose the more difficult country area. He stayed in a small town with an unfinished church, and when it was completed, he moved to a town with a log church. There he built himself a small log cabin, rarely lit a fire, slept little, often lived on bread and water, and walked miles to visit farm after remote farm. John's parishioners were from many lands and tongues, but John knew twelve languages and worked with them all. He joined the Redemptorists at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in 1840, taking his vows at Baltimore, Maryland in 1841, the first Redemptorist to do so in the United States. Home missioner in Maryland, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Virginia. Rector of Saint Philomena church in Pittsburgh in 1844. Vice-regent and superior of the Redemptorists in America in 1847. Bishop of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in 1852. Bishop John built fifty churches and began building a cathedral. He opened almost one hundred schools, and the number of parochial school students in his diocese grew from 500 to 9,000. He wrote articles, two catechisms, and many works in German. First American man and first American bishop to be canonized. *Born:* 28 March 1811 at Prachititz, Bohemia (Czech Republic) *Died:* 5 January 1860 of a stroke at 13th and Vine Streets, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, interred in a glass tomb under the altar at the National Shrine of Saint John Neumann in Philadelphia *Venerated:* 11 December 1921 by Pope Benedict XV (decree on heroic virtues) *Beatified:* 13 October 1963 by Pope Paul VI at Rome, Italy *Canonized:* 19 June 1977 by Pope Paul VI

Información de comunidad Español

El mito puede considerarse falso en un sentido estricto histórico y, sin embargo, puede que aún exista una realidad muy profunda contenida en el mito que merezca nuestra creencia. Que Herodes ordenara una masacre de niños nacidos en la época de los viajes de los Magos justifica ese tipo de creencia, aunque a los historiadores les cueste mucho publicar tal realidad. Típico de los enemigos de Jesús, Herodes no podía tolerar el peligro que Jesús representaba para los poderes malignos que lo sostenían. Aunque Herodes no ordenara la masacre, fue lo suficientemente cruel como para ordenar la muerte de sus propios hijos, a quienes veía como rivales.

El evangelio de Mateo fue escrito principalmente para una audiencia judía que tenía dificultades para acoger a los creyentes gentiles. Este es el evangelio en el que Jesús dijo a sus discípulos que salieran en misión pero "solo a las ovejas perdidas de la casa de Israel." Y le dijo a la mujer cananea que había sido "enviado solo a la oveja perdida de la casa de Israel." Fue su fiel persistencia lo que le hizo ver que su misión podía abrazar a otros más allá de su propio pueblo. Ese cambio de opinión se encontró al final de su evangelio en sus instrucciones de "ir y hacer discípulos de todas las naciones."

Esta misión inclusiva de Cristo ya está anticipada en el capítulo inicial del evangelio de Mateo, donde visitantes exóticos de Oriente son los primeros en rendir homenaje a Jesús. Los Magos eran en realidad sacerdotes persas, astrólogos que servían a su rey con habilidades como interpretar sueños. Con regalos para el niño Jesús, anticiparon cómo los gentiles acudirán en masa a las comunidades cristianas, trayendo dones para la misión. Pablo, a su manera, refleja el espíritu de los Magos a través de su descubrimiento transformador del misterio del amor de Cristo. El evangelio de Mateo continuará destacando a Cristo como nuestro Emmanuel, Dios con nosotros, sin desconocidos a ojos de Dios.
