A Note From Fr. Jim Kinney

One of the somewhat obvious questions non-believers may have of Christians is how their prayer life puts them in touch with God. Those who say that God or Jesus has spoken to them may be asked: what exactly did Jesus say? What did his voice sound like? Like the robbers and thieves Jesus warns about, non-believers might try to dissuade us from the messaging and quaint pastoral imagery Jesus has adopted from his time and culture. But others of different faith traditions, or none at all, may actually find similarities between the many things that Jesus said and did and find that it resonates with something deep and good within themselves.

In today's Gospel Jesus speaks of his role as the gate through which he leads his sheep. Later in John's Gospel Jesus is more explicit about his role as the Good Shepherd- all part of John's Good Shepherd discourse. While in our modern day we may find Jesus' pastoral imagery dated, the religious guidance is unmistakably resonant with people outside as well within the Catholic, Christian community.

Instead of concentrating on what people see, Jesus underlines what we hear from the heart paralleling what Peter's shocked audience hears and is "cut to the heart." Rather than the image of the Good Shepherd carrying the lost sheep, Jesus focuses on recognizing the shepherd's voice and the way that the shepherd and sheep know one another. The Buddhist monk, Thich Nhat Hanh popularized the word "interbeing," indicating the relationships Jesus speaks of as the interconnectedness and interdependence of everything that exists.

There is nothing that happens, nothing that we do or say, no event that does not have effects on everything else. We live in one another as well as with one another. While physics and psychology tells us that universal interconnectedness is the basic reality in which we exist, we often fail to perceive it. Therefore, we can imagine that we are independent, self-made and related to others by choice rather than by nature. The relationship that Jesus describes with his sheep is one in which both sides choose to be aware of and cultivate their inescapable, intimate relationship. Blessings, *Fr. Jim*

Saint Gianna Beretta Molla
Feast: April 28

Tenth of thirteen children born to Alberto and Maria Beretta, she was a pious girl raised in a pious family; one sister became a Canossian missionary nun, and two brothers, including Venerable Enrico Beretta became priests. While in college, she worked with the poor and elderly, and joined the *Saint Vincent de Paul Society*. Physician and surgeon, graduating from the University of Pavia in 1949, she started a clinic in Mero, Italy

in 1950. She returned to school and studied pediatrics, and after finishing in 1952 she worked especially with mothers, babies, the elderly, and the poor. Active in *Catholic Action*, she considered a call to religious life, but was married to Pietro Molla on 24 September 1955 at Magenta. Mother of three, she continued her medical career, treating it as a mission and gift from God. During her fourth pregnancy, she was diagnosed with a large ovarian cyst. Her surgeon recommended an abortion in order to save Gianna's life; she refused and died a week after childbirth, caring more for doing right by her unborn child than for her own life. Today that child is a physician herself, and involved in the pro-life movement. *Born:* 4 October 1922 in Magenta, Milan, Italy *Died:* 28 April 1962 in Monza Maternity Hospital, Monza, Italy of complications from an ovarian cyst *Venerated:* 6 July 1991 by Pope John Paul II *Beatified:* 24 April 1994 by Pope John Paul II in Rome, Italy *Canonized:* 16 May 2004 by Pope John Paul II; the canonization miracle involved the birth of a baby who gestated with no amniotic fluid but a constant stream of prayers for the intercession of St. Gianna.

Ask A Franciscan: I realize that I can sin by some action (i.e. murder or theft), but I do not understand how someone can sin by inaction? Yes, sins of commission are pretty easy to recognize. A sin of omission can easily slip under a person's radar because "Nobody else took action in that situation." In-Matthew 25:31-46 (Jesus separating the sheep from the goats at the Last Judgment). Those condemned (the goats) are not identified by deliberate actions against people. Instead, those who are condemned have only one thing in common: one or more sins of omission, a failure to recognize people in great need. If that story were longer, we might hear the condemned ask: "Who knew they mattered?" The rich man in Luke 16:19-31 was not deliberately cruel to Lazarus, but he ignored a very needy man at his gate. James 2:14-16 tells us that responding to a person in need by saying, "Goodbye and good luck! Keep warm and well fed," while making no attempt to address those needs indicates a lifeless faith. The overall sin is deliberately making invisible someone in great need. No one can do everything, but everyone can do something. *Father Pat McCloskey, OFM*

Información de comunidad Español

Una de las preguntas algo obvias que los no creyentes pueden tener sobre los cristianos es cómo su vida de oración les pone en contacto con Dios. A quienes dicen que Dios o Jesús les ha hablado pueden preguntarse: ¿qué dijo exactamente Jesús? ¿Cómo sonaba su voz? Al igual que los ladrones y ladrones de los que Jesús advierte, los no creyentes podrían intentar disuadirnos del mensaje y la curiosa imaginaria pastoral que Jesús ha adoptado de su época y cultura. Pero otros de diferentes tradiciones de fe, o ninguna, pueden encontrar similitudes entre las muchas cosas que Jesús dijo e hizo y descubrir que resuena con algo profundo y bueno dentro de ellos.

En el Evangelio actual, Jesús habla de su papel como la puerta por la que guía a sus ovejas. Más adelante en el Evangelio de Juan, Jesús es más explícito sobre su papel como Buen Pastor, todo parte del discurso de Juan sobre el Buen Pastor. Aunque en la actualidad podemos encontrar la imaginaria pastoral de Jesús anticuada, la orientación religiosa resuena inconfundiblemente tanto con personas externas como dentro de la comunidad católica y cristiana.

En lugar de concentrarse en lo que la gente ve, Jesús subraya lo que oímos desde el corazón, paralelizando lo que oye el público sorprendido de Pedro y es "cortado al corazón". En lugar de la imagen del Buen Pastor llevando a la oveja perdida, Jesús se centra en reconocer la voz del pastor y la forma en que el pastor y las ovejas se conocen. El monje budista Thich Nhat Hanh popularizó la palabra "interser", indicando las relaciones de las que Jesús habla como la interconexión e interdependencia de todo lo que existe.

No ocurre nada, nada que hagamos o decimos, ningún evento que no tenga efectos en todo lo demás. Vivimos los unos en los otros y también juntos. Aunque la física y la psicología nos dicen que la interconexión universal es la realidad básica en la que existimos, a menudo no la percibimos. Por lo tanto, podemos imaginar que somos independientes, hechos a nosotros mismos y que estamos relacionados con los demás por elección y no por naturaleza. La relación que Jesús describe con sus ovejas es aquella en la que ambas partes eligen ser conscientes y cultivar su relación íntima e ineludible.
